Kenneth White Lectures in the North

Kenneth White will give three new lectures in late October 2005 on the theme The Geopoetics Project as part of the Hi-Arts International Fellowship 2005 Creativity and the North. They are: North Atlantic Investigations in the MacPhail Hall in Ullapool on Saturday 29 October at 5 pm; Return to the Territory - A Highland Reconnaissance in Beaufort Hotel in Inverness on Sunday 30 October at 7 pm; and A Sense of High North in Orkney College in Kirkwall on Monday 31 October at 7 pm. Geopoetics Weekend Course

This is a great opportunity to explore geopoetics in depth, so book now to attend the Weekend Course – Geopoetics: Place, Culture, World on Saturday 19 and Sunday 20 November 2005 from 9.30 – 16.30 at the Edinburgh University Office of Lifelong Learning.

This introductory two-day course is the first one of its kind in Scotland. It is of significance in this

period of transition following devolution, since it focuses on the problems of globalisation, and offers a means of radical cultural renewal. It will trace the development of geopoetics in the poetry, essays and waybooks of Kenneth White, and will also discuss its relationship general critique to modernity that includes ecopost-modernity logical deep ecology. Key aspects in the history of the arts and sciences will be used to illustrate White's contention that a "new epoch of being is possible".

The origins of geopoetics are in earlier critiques of modernity, and in key developments in the history of Western and Eastern cultures. These diverse developments will be brought together in this presentation of geopoetics which will include lectures and discussion such themes as modernity and its critics, the wanderer and his charts, grounding a world, poetic intelligence - the great work-field, a new way of being in the world, embracing the real, and opening a new cultural space. This interdisciplinary course on geopoetics, linking many branches of the Arts and Sciences, is most timely and ought to have a wide appeal.

The lecturers will be Bill Eddie, Norman Bissell, Rachel Blow and Jim McCarthy. There are still some places left on the course which costs £75 for two full days, so phone 0131 650 4400 now to enrol.

Notes for the Geopoetics visit to Falkland, 18 June 2005 by Tess Darwin

Cultivating a space in the world

"Geopoetics is concerned, fundamentally, with a relationship to the earth and with the opening of a world." Kenneth White

Falkland is a good place to be what Kenneth White calls a 'geopoetician'. I only came to

live here in December 2004, but I already feel a deep sense of belonging. This place is special in many ways. There are good reasons why people have lived here since prehistoric times. It's about more than the essential natural resources of stone, wood and water. It's also a healing place, a sacred place, dominated by the beautifully breast-shaped Falkland Hill.

A world is opening for me in Falkland; here I am finding a way of being in the world, the way I want to be in the world. I have become part of what Kenneth White talked about at my first Geopoetics meeting (in Edinburgh, August 2003) - an association of individuals concerned with

discussion and debate, in a coordinated, collective enterprise: the stewardship of the land and its community of people and wildlife.

There's also a close link here to the thinking of Patrick Geddes, who believed that geography and philosophy "should actually be connected. Really there is only Geosophy". As Murdo Macdonald has pointed out, Geddes' stained glass image of the Valley Section could be "a model of the village of Falkland in the shadow of the Lomond Hills, with its water courses irrigating the farmland of the plain of the Eden and eventually reaching the sea". The Latin words inscribed below

the Valley Section translate as 'microcosm of nature ~ abode of human beings ~ theatre of history ~ good place of the future'; how could Falkland be described more succinctly?

Geddes said, "This is a green world, with animals comparatively few and small, and all dependent on the leaves. By leaves we live" – not by money but the fullness of our harvests. In Falkland, the fullness of harvests is what we see around us today - the fruit of generations of labour and care that we have a responsibility to sustain for the coming generations.

As Kenneth White says, "A world is a place, a space that one cultivates. And in order to be up to that world-cultivation, one has to cultivate oneself". I am finding my place here, cultivating my way of being in this world, by walking, every day, getting to know the seasons, the stone, wood and water, the wildlife - using all my senses to become attuned to the natural world and develop my relationship with the morethan-human world that surrounds us.

I am primarily an ecologist, and Falkland is a good and very challenging place to try and live by my beliefs. As Kenneth White says, Geopoetics goes further than ecology: it is not only concerned with the relationship between humans and

our environment, but also the expression of that relationship – which is the poetics; and brings in a cultural approach. I am trying to express this through writing and finding ways to share what I love about Falkland with others.

Equally important, in a very practical sense, I am trying to share responsibility for the future of this place, for managing the land and caring for biodiversity.

Ninian Crichton Stuart, as the Steward of Falkland, is creatively seeking ways to share stewardship of not just the land but also the diverse communities that have an interest in this place.

It is exciting to be living here and seeking ways to follow Kenneth White's challenge of being able to open out beyond our humanity into a geopoetic way of being in the world – cultivating bodymind, being connected, getting outside oneself, an expansion of the mind.
